

# CBRN SLC

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## Course Description

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**Purpose:** To enhance CBRN senior noncommissioned officers abilities to lead, train, direct subordinates, and provide advise in the execution of unified land operation in any environment by providing NCOs with the technical knowledge and training required to successfully serve as First Sergeants, Platoon Sergeants, and Staff NCOs.

**Scope:** Students will demonstrate proficiency in CBRN vulnerability assessment, reconnaissance and surveillance planning, decontamination operations planning, CBRN NCO staff functions, CBRN defense program, CBRN reporting and warning system, Joint Effects Model, advance toxic agent training and orders production.

**Prerequisite:** Active Army or Active Guard Reserve (AGR) enlisted personnel in the 74D Career Management Field (SSG (P) or SFC). Soldiers must be a graduate of the Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear (CBRN) Basic Noncommissioned Officer Course (BNCOC), CBRN Advanced Leader Course (ALC), or CBRN Transition Course. Soldiers must have a completed pre-execution check list, SIGNED BY THE UNIT COMMANDER, upon arrival at SLC. Soldiers who do not have the required pre-execution checklist within the time frame allocated in TRADOC Reg 350-18 will be returned to their units. Soldiers must complete five online courses (approximately 16 hrs of training) PRIOR to attending the CBRN SLC (bring certificates with you to in-processing).

- 2) IS-200.B: ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incident3)
- 3) IS-700.A: NIMS an Introduction4)
- 4) IS-800.B: NRF, an Introduction

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## Course Overview

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Noncommissioned officers from all components (active, reserve, guard) of the Army train together on a daily basis. The course is conducted in three two-week phases (phases 1, 2, and 3). The course occurs six-days a week. Army physical readiness training is done Monday through Friday, at the platoon level, from 0530 through 0630. Academic training begins at 0800 and ends at 1800, subject to change; students can expect one-hour for lunch.

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## Technology Requirements

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Students will be issued a laptop. Classrooms are equipped with internet, wired and wireless. Hotels rooms have internet capabilities, also. Students should be proficient with Microsoft Office Suite or equivalent software.

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## Course Policies

## Evaluation Criteria

Students will receive one DA Form 1059, Service School Academic Evaluation Report, upon completion of each phase or upon completion of Phase III. Students that are schedule to attend one or two phases of training will receive a DA Form 1059 on the last day of the phase. Students that complete the three-phases consecutively will receive one DA Form 1059.

In addition to the demonstrated abilities that are evaluated as part of the Service School Academic Evaluation Report, Students will continuously be evaluated on their character in accordance with ADP 6-22, ADRP 6-22, and FM 6-22.
